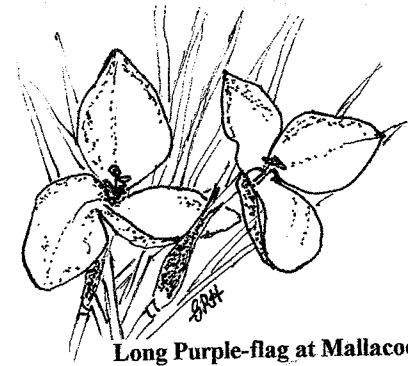


# Castlemaine Naturalist

## SEANA Campout, Mallacoota, October 14-18 - Rita Mills

The two-day trip, via the mountains, not the city, was well worth it. Our time was full of interest, from birding at Gypsy Point, surrounded for much of the walk by the sound of Bell Miners, watching White-bellied Sea Eagles and Caspian Terns fishing, or tiny brown birds hunting insects near a log - never did find out what they were - to walking down the cleared power-line track off miners track surrounded by a sea of blue Patersonias, the Native Flag, and finding orchids, boronias, fascinating sedges and a dainty little pea, which I finally found was the Leafless Globe-pea, hidden among them - and that was only the first day. The bird list I made for the morning at Gypsy Point came to 42, but I suspect some of the others had a more impressive list than that!

Our second morning was spent in the Old Coast Road- shipwreck Creek area. We walked through coastal forest, which was predominantly Bloodwoods, and out onto coastal heathlands. There were lots of different peas, including a taller form of the Handsome Flat-pea, which we find here as an almost prostrate plant, and a pale flowered Gompholobium.

I didn't see a lot of birds, but a Yellow Robin and Grey Fantails were soon seen as we started down the track. As we didn't have a local guide our leader from the Sale Club dubbed it a discovery walk, and we soon strung out along the length of the track, from those who didn't go far from the cars because they were birding and finding orchids near there, to those of us who walked right down to the heathland, going from a forest where there was little understorey, other than scattered herbs and orchids and ferns, to a crowded "understorey" and only a few clumps of Melaleucas, Callistemons and stunted Eucalypts.

We had a free afternoon, and as we'd taken lunch with us, we returned, after dropping our passenger off, to a hidden picnic area on the Betka River, and had picnic lunch accompanied by Silveryeyes, honeyeaters and Whipbirds.

That evening we had our meal at the club with the rest of the group, and later were treated to a most interesting talk and slide presentation by an expert ornithologist, Dr David Hollands, a medico from Orbost, who is a mad keen Owl man and has travelled to many parts of the world photographing owls.

The next day, Monday, was another early start as we joined the little M.V. Loch Ard for a four-hour trip around various arms of the Mallacoota Inlet. Captain Bob was a very knowledgeable fellow and kept up a commentary on the history of the area, its settlement, characters and fishing history (by the way, an abalone licence that cost just \$2 in 1960 will cost you \$7 million today!).

As we left the Jetty Bob pointed out the small colony of pelicans on the little island opposite, telling us that they were the geriatrics which were no longer breeding, and were now looking to be fed when any fishing boats came in and cleaned their catch. Later in the morning we could see the other part of the colony, along with hundreds of Black Swans, many with cygnets, out on the Goodwin Sands.

As we motored gently along we wound in and out of bays, and I could well understand that fishermen every so often have to make radio or mobile phone contact to find out how to get back to Mallacoota! When we were in the Twin Creeks area we found ourselves among hundreds of jellyfish which come into the inlet to breed, and leave again once they are about twenty centimetres across. Once when the sandbar blocked the outlet to the sea there were some huge ones trapped in the lakes system.

We landed on one of the small jetties where we were given morning tea and a chance to stretch our legs before heading back, but not before going across the arm to inspect Fairhaven, one of the oldest properties on the lakes. We were back by 11.30am. If we had been much longer the wind would have got up, and the inlet, being very shallow, can suddenly whip up short steep waves, which are not very pleasant to be caught out in, though there are places where boats can go in to shelter.

Our afternoon was spent doing the Pittosporum walk from the park in the town, through littoral forest and down onto the beach to Bastion Point. A number of Bar-tailed Godwits and Pied Oystercatchers were among the birds seen on that walk.

On Tuesday Doug and I decided not to join the group going to Marlo as we would be heading home that way the next day. Instead drove up to Eden to have a look around, and found ourselves up at the lookout - and three Humpback Whales were in the bay, so that was a thrill for us both.

## BOCA Bird Challenge Count - Sat 3 December.

**Who can take part?** Anyone can. We need at least three teams, each of three or four people. You do not need to be an expert. Each team will have an experienced leader to help.

**What is the aim of the count?** The aim is to see as many species of bird as possible within a 40km radius of Castlemaine, and count the numbers of each species. For a bird to be counted, it must be identified by at least two people by sight, or three people by sound. That is why we need teams. Sightings by a sole observer cannot be counted.

**Meet at the Old Tourist Information Centre opposite the Castle Motel at 8.15am for an 8.30am start.**

**How long will it take?** We usually have all-day teams and half-day teams. All day people take snacks and lunch. Half-day people bring morning or afternoon tea. All bring binoculars. Return to the Old Information Centre by 5.30pm. For half-day trips, lunch is between 12.15pm and 1.00 pm.

**Other years.** CFNC has been taking part for many years. We do much the same area each year, so the bird count can be compared year by year, and we get a picture of whether bird numbers are increasing or not. It is a very enjoyable day. It does not require high speed travelling - it is hard to see birds at high speed. Because many other groups are taking part, bird numbers can be compared across the nation.

**How to register.** Please give me your name by Wed 30 November, so that teams can be arranged.

### Walk (3). Peelers Rd., Barkers Creek, 28/9/05. (Leader: Rita Mills)

A wet morning wasn't promising for the afternoon walk, and only three of us, Frances Cincotta, her sister from Melbourne and myself turned up. We decided to go anyway, and I soon found my doubts were allayed, as the few Pink Fingers (*Caladenia carnea*) and Dusky Fingers (*Caladenia fuscata*) I'd found on Saturday were by Wednesday in their scores, and the odd Leopard Orchid were dozens by then - mind you, they were only only about 15 cm high again this year. The Beard Heath had started to flower in the meantime, and best of all, we found the one plant that has pink flowers. As far as I know these are the only plants of Beard Heath on the north side of the town.

Plants for the afternoon were:

Hedge, Rough, Ploughshare, Golden and Gold-dust Wattle (*Acacia paradoxa*, *A. aspera*, *A. gunnii*, *A. pycnantha* and *A. acinacea*), Slender Rice-flower (*Pimelea linifolia*), Fairy Wax (*Philotheca verrucosa*), Purple-leaf Groundsel (*Senecio tenuiflorus*), Pink Bells (*Tetradlea ciliata*), Waxlip Orchid (including one pure white one) (*Glossodia major*), and Leopard Orchid (*Diuris pardina*), Pink Fingers (*Caladenia carnea*), Dusky Fingers (*C. fuscata*), White Marianth (*Rhytidisporum procumbens*), Common Woodrush (*Luzula meridionalis*), Downy Grevillea (*G. alpina*), Early Nancy (*Wurmbea dioica*), Yam Daisy (*Microseris* sp.), Common Beard Heath (*Leucopogon virgata*), including a specimen with pink flowers, Common Wedge Pea (*Gompholobium huegelii*) and Grey Everlasting (*Ozothamnus obcordatus*) were in bud.

**Walk (5). Quartz Hill Track, 12/10/05.** (Leader: Michael Kennedy) Michael and Carla generously offered to have a walk on their 30 acre, Land for Wildlife property. The front of the block is quite weedy but as we moved deeper onto the property to beautiful rocky outcrops and along a very pretty sandstone-lined dry waterway we discovered more and more interesting plants. In true FN fashion we ran out of time before we reached the "more interesting" part of the property but everyone enjoyed the opportunity to visit a new area and expressed interest in a longer visit another time.

Because this was a new area we included plants that were not flowering (nf). Austral Indigo (*Indigofera australis*), Bedstraw (*Galium sp.*), Blanket Fern (*Pleurosorus rutifolius*), Blue Pincushion (*Brunonia australis nf*) Buttons (*Craspedia sp.*), Chocolate Lily (*Arthropodium strictum nf*), Common Hovea (*Hovea heterophylla nf*), Common Wood-rush (*Lazula meridionalis*), Cranberry Heath (*Astroloma humifusum nf*), Daphne Heath (*Brachyloma daphnoides nf*), Early Black wattle (*Acacia decurrens*), Early Nancy (*Wurmbea dioica*), Golden wattle (*Acacia pycnantha nf*), Greencomb Spider-orchid (*Caladenia sp.*), Grey Everlasting (*Ozothamus obcordatus*) nf Hedge wattle (*Aciacia paradoxa*), Majenta Stork's-bill (*Pelargonium rodneyanum nf*), Musky Hood (*Caladenia gracillis*), Necklace fern (*Asplenium flabellifolium*), Pink Fingers (*Caladenia carnea*), Rock Fern (*Cheilanthes sp.*) Rough wattle (*Acacia aspera*), Scaly Buttons (*Leptorhynchus squamatus*), Scented Sundew (*Drosera whittakeri ssp aberrans nf*), Showy Podolepis (*Podolepis jaceoides*), Slender Rice-flower (*Pimelia linifolia*), Slender Sun-orchid (*Thelemitra pauciflora*), Spurred Velleia (*Vellia paradoxa nf*), Sticky Everlasting (*Xerochrysum viscosum*), Sweet Bursaria (*Bursaria spinosa ssp spinosa*), Tall Sundew (*Drosera peltata ssp auriculata nf*), Waxlip Orchid (*Glossodia major*), Yam Daisy (*Microseris sp.*)

Acacia melanoxylon (Blackwood), Callistemon sieberi (River Bottlebrush), Chrysocephalum apiculatum (Common Everlasting Daisy), Correa glabra (Rock Correa), Einadia nutans (Nodding Salt Bush), Glycine tabacina (Variable Glycine), Dodonaea viscosa ssp. spatulata (Hop Bush) and Velleia paradoxa (Spur Velleia).

Also, on a walk on Mt Tarrengower (as part of Maldon Folk Festival) the delightfully scented Cynoglossum suaveolens (Sweet Hound's-tongue) was flowering.

- 16/10 Visiting Ringwood Group sighted a **Crested Bellbird** at Chinaman's Point.
- 26/10 A healthy-looking large female **koala** sighted in a tree along Hagues Road, Barkers Creek. Geraldine Harris
- A **frog** has taken up residence in the Perkins Garden. Ern Perkins
- A **Darter** has been sighted on Lake Joanna in the Castlemaine Botanic Gardens. George Broadway
