THE BOTANIC GARDENS

The Gardens were gazetted in 1856 and it is thought that they were laid out by Mr P. Doran, the first curator, and previously an apprentice to Joseph Paxton of "Chatsworth" in Derbyshire. Ferdinand Mueller provided many hundreds of plants for the garden. The Gardens are entered through an impressive set of cast iron gates set on fine bluestone piers. A manicured garden of lawn, rose beds and annuals near the entrance is contrasted with a large natural area. The gardens are dominated by a naturally designed lake in the centre. They contain many fine trees.

The Castlemaine Botanic Gardens form part of a collection of outstanding country botanic gardens in Victoria and are themselves one of the earliest in the State. They reflect the development of such features that came with the wealth provided to some towns by "gold money". The gardens are a major feature in this important historic town.

The Gardens have seen many changes in the past 124 years. Their history is not well documented and it is therefore not possible to know the period when they were given their current form.

HAMILTON'S CROSSING EXCURSION

The excursion was made in warm autumn sunshine.

The first stop was to the banks of the Loddon, in private proerty, a few kilometres upstream from Hamilton's Crossing. It was a beautiful spot, with many mature red gums. One giant has a circumference equal to the outstretched arms of five people, making it about 10 metres around, and a diameter of about 2.5 metres. If the diameter grows at 2 centimetres a year, the age would be a little over 1000 years!

Bull oaks were also quite common along the top of the cliff edge. They were possibly much more common before settlement, and only remnants now remain. Bottle shaped Fairy Martin nests were evident along the cliff. We counted almost 50 of them but no evidence of occupation was seen.

At Hamilton's Crossing the Verbena plants were in flower, and the centre of attraction of several species of butterfly.

The bird list was

Some of the group returned home through Baringhup and Joyces Creek. Three Black -shouldered Kites were seen hovering, about a kilometre from the Crossing. Near Baringhup a small flock of Crested Pigeons were seen. They were along a fence at the edge of the road, and allowed a good view.

One of the roads from Hamilton's Crossing to Baringhup was lined with St Barnaby's Thistle. The thistle seems to be uncommon in the Castlemaine district — at least it is not on the plant list. Like most thistles, it is an attractive plant. Although the flower head has quite sharp prickles, the rest of the plant is quite soft and spineless.

Quite large flocks of Galahs were roosting on dead trees in Cairn Curran. They are particularly attrractive birds when lit by the setting sun. Birds seen on Cairn Curran were

Lapwing Galah White-fronted Chat
Silver Gull Pee Wee Black-fronted Plover
Magpie Straw-neck Ibis Little Pied Cormorant
White Ibis Mountain Duck White-faced Heron.
Yellow-bill Spoonbill.

CONDITIONS OF GRANT

- 1. The grant is for the purposes outlined in the letter of notification from the Minister for Conservation, Forests and Lands, and is subject to the general conditions stated in that letter and the particular conditions set out below.
- The group may spend the funds in the twelve months from the date of issue of the grant cheque.
- 3. The group will provide to the Minister, by 18 December 1987, a report of progress of the project including a statement of expenditure to that date.
- 4. If the project is incomplete and the grant has not been totally spent by 18 December 1987, the group will also provide by that data a plan of work and expenditure for the remainder of the project and grant. Further reporting will be as agreed by the group and the Minister.
- 5. At the completion of the project, the group will provide an income and expenditure statement, together with a certificate from an authorised representative of the group that the grant has been expended in accordance with the approved purpose, and that the income and expenditure statement is a true and fair record.
- Any unexpended funds or unapplied grant must be returned to the Minister for reallocation not later than the end of the grant period.
- 7. At the completion of the project, the group will provide to the Minister four copies of any reports, publications or other materials produced as part of the project.
- 8. The selling price of any publications or other saleable products of the project shall be kept as low as possible and shall be set to cover costs of production and not to secure profits.

OBSERVATIONS FOR APRIL

KOALA was observed in March in Grey Box/yellow gum.

PARSONS BANDS were seen in flower at the Rise and Shine area in Clydesdale. These autumn flowering orchids are named because of a resemblence to a parson's neck-wear.

AURUMN MIDGE ORCHIDS were quite common on March 29th at Clydesdale. They are hard to see, with dark wiry stem no more than 10 cm long, and small dark flowers. There was previously only a single record of this orchid, for Kalimna many years ago. The same orchid, Prasophyllum rufum, was also found in the same week in Kalimna. The identity of both specimens was confirmed by the National Herbarium

ACACIA DIFFORMIS is one of Victoria's rarest wattles, and previously was known in this district from a small stand in the Sandon Forest. It is similar in appearance to the Golden Wattles, but has narrower duller leaves. Its main identifying feature is, a faint second vein, more or less parallel to the main vein. The Wattle has now been found in two new localities in the district. One of these is on the Clydesdale - Sandon road, and was noticed by E. Perkins. The second was near the Muckleford Forest, on the road to the forest that leaves the main road about kilometre after the Muckleford Creek bridge, was discovered by Ian Higgins. There have been reports of A. hakeoides in this area - these need review, as perhaps all are A. difformis

RUFOUS FANTAIL has been observed along the Fryerstown - Taradale road by Peter Starr.

NANKEEN NIGHT HERON. A juvenile has been reported for the lake in the Botanic Gardens. This could perhaps be the same individual as seen in the Muckleford area about a month ago.

SPARROWHAWK IN CASTLEMAINE?

A smallish hawk has been noticed several times flying low in the Doveton Street area. Its habit suggests it may be a Sparrowhawk. Some of the distinguishing features of the Sparrowhawk are broad blunt wings, a notched tail, and greyish markings. Further observations are needed.
